As always at this time, year end financials are not yet available. The full report will come to you with my fall dues letter. But, at fiscal year end, June 30, our bank balance was slightly over \$5000, so we are still solvent. As usual, our largest expense was subscription to the Alumni Weekly.

One hundred and forty-six classmates paid their \$33 dues for the year. This is 72% of our living membership,
