JAMES BALDWIN—DOWN FROM THE MOUNTAINTOP

Calvin Levels, Tony Award nominee, playwright, and actor, becomes James Baldwin in this critically acclaimed one-man show. The play follows the fervent life of renowned author and civil rights activist Baldwin, from his early childhood as a fiery young minister in Harlem, to his first experiences with sex and love, and on to the publishing of his written works, including *Go Tell It on the Mountain* and *Giovanni's Room*. The play depicts Baldwin's many relationships and rivalries with Richard Wright, Norman Mailer, Langston Hughes, and Lorraine Hansberry as well as many others. The play also explores his association with Malcolm X; Dr. Martin Luther King Jr.; and the civil rights movement. Calvin Levels additionally received nominations for Best Actor in a Play for the New York Drama Desk Award and New York Outer Critics Circle Award.
